InterCounty Connector Forum to be Held May 12

It was formally resolved by the NFCCA at its February 2004 meeting that it carry out a special forum that would present “both sides” of the proposed *InterCounty Connector (ICC)* before considering whether or not the Association would take a position on this controversial project. Other than recognizing the controversy from articles in the media and positions taken by county and state politicians and a number of private organizations,

many of us are somewhat in the dark about the project which has produced a welter of strident claims and counter claims by adherents for and against it.

In pursuance of forum participants, I was directed to Sam Rader of the State Highway Administration (SHA), which is responsible for planning and constructing the ICC. After several years of considering various alternative routes, the SHA has settled on two potential east-west alignments that would connect I-270 near Gaithersburg with the town of Laurel in Prince Georges County. Rader will provide an update on SHA plans for the project and Richard Parsons, representing the Montgomery County Board of Trade, will offer arguments in favor of the ICC. Arguments against funding and construction of the ICC will be made by two members of the Sierra Club, Montgomery Group.

Because of the limited time before our summer break, the forum will be held on **Wednesday, 12 May, at 7:30 p.m. at the Rec Center**. The association can then vote following on the presentations whether to support the ICC, not to support it, or sim-

ply to remain neutral without taking a position. Alternatively, the Association can defer voting until 9 June 2004 to allow time for members to absorb the data presented. A special make-up board of our directors will be held after 12 May before the summer hiatus. In so far as I know, no forum has been presented to the public, although the issue has been widely debated by the two opposing sides. ■

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Next Meeting on April 14th

The next meeting of the Northwood-Four Corners Civic Association will be held on Wednesday, 14 April 2004 at 7:30 p.m. at the North Four Corners Rec Center. The Rec Center is located at the end of Southwood Road, just off Edgewood Drive.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

A number of present and future issues and events that affect our community are worthy of note. These include:

1. The addition of a Trader Joe's market on Colesville Road below Lockwood Drive (see story on page 3).
2. Ongoing negotiations with the County Council and elements of the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission (MNCCP) on trash collection in our streetscaping facility (see below).
3. Competition for North Four Corners Park (see story on page 7).
4. Renaming of the Northwest Trail in our local stream valley park as the "Rachel Carson Greenway" (see page 4).
5. Reopening of Northwood High School (see story on page 8).
6. An association-requested forum on the effects of the Intercounty Connector (ICC) and Bi-County Transit Connector (formerly the "Inner Purple Line) on our fiscal and traffic problems (see story on page 1).

Negotiations on the streetscape trash pick-up problem continue. Alan Friedman, a member of our board of directors, has negotiated with the major players in this issue. Negotiations with the County Council have not been encouraging. Although trash pickup is continuing at two other sites in the County, we have been advised that the Council will not move on this issue although the legality of the other pickups is questionable in terms of equity. Presumably, the current poor state of County finances rules out official action. We were advised to initiate a suit against the County Executive to achieve any relief. Unless we have an affluent *pro bono* lawyer in our midst or wish to engage in a major fund raising campaign to sue the County government, a suit would appear impracticable at present. At least one resident, who served as a volunteer trash remover and who lives near the mini-park, has complained about public health threats (rats, for example, are drawn to the site). Alan will continue to see other means until June, at which time we may have to seek a radical alternative, namely, to have the streetscape facility removed as a public nuisance.

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Rachel Carson Greenway Celebration

On Saturday, March 20, at the Burnt Mills Dam on Colesville Road, the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission (MNPPC) celebrated the renaming of the former Northwest Branch Trail Corridor as the Rachel Carson Greenway in honor of the late renowned pioneer American natural scientist and early environmentalist.

Both the east bank and west bank natural surface trails between Colesville Road (Rt. 29) and Randolph Road have been improved during the past several years, thanks to a combined partnership of the MNCPPC and local residents. Many of the latter are from the communities along this major tributary of the Anacostia river. Headed by a dedicated team of Park and Planning trails specialists, the effort was also aided by the Americorps' National Conservation Corps, and the Montgomery County Conserva-

tion Corps. Currently this recreational trail complex offers a six-mile loop of the river north of the Burnt Mills Dam and an east bank trail below Colesville Road extending to the Capital Beltway Bridge where it joins a hard surface trail that runs all the way to the Peace Cross in Prince Georges County and a further connection with trails on the Northeast Branch and D.C.

MNCPPC plans to extend the trail north to Rachel Carson Conservation Park and the Patuxent River. There are also tentative plans to connect the Rachel Carson Greenway with the Seneca River Greenway and the Potomac River in western Montgomery County. This overall natural surface trail would provide from 90 to 100 miles of outdoor recreation for and natural observation while passing through some of the most historic and scenic regions of the county, including portions of the famed Under-

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ground Railway, which provided an avenue of flight from slave-holding states to the free states of the north before the Emancipation Proclamation of Abraham Lincoln. MNCPPC staff is planning another community meeting in April. For more information, the new website address for Montgomery County's trail network is www.montgomerytrails.org. Lyn Coleman, 301-650-4391, serves as project supervisor.

As part of the celebration, attendees could participate in a one-mile nature walk or six-mile hike along the trail or visit the Carson home at 11701 Berwick Lane in the Quaint Acres neighborhood, where she lived while writing her seminal book, *Silent Spring*, published in 1962, which helped launch the modern environmental movement. She died in 1964. ■

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North Four Corners Park Update

Following the decision at the last Association meeting to request an appointment with our County Council representative to discuss our concerns about the Parks and Recreation Departments' two competing proposals for the North Four Corners Park expansion and to present our community's alternative, NFCCA President Charles Pritchard contacted Marilyn Praisner's office for this purpose. Her legislative aide indicated that they are aware of the issue and are monitoring developments. However, the earliest date that a meeting could be scheduled was June 4. While this date was

accepted for an appointment, the NFCCA will actively seek other avenues for communicating its position to County officials, including contacting the local press.

Since the Parks Department staff had previously said that another public meeting on the park would be held in March but no notice had been received by March 8th, NFCCA Vice President Jim Zepp spoke with Heidi Sussman, the planner assigned to the project, to confirm whether or not this was scheduled. She informed him that the Parks Department management has decided to broaden the facilities planning project to include the existing park. Among the implications of

this change is that the Parks Department may address the overflow-parking problem by demolishing the recreation center building to build a larger parking lot. Zepp noted that parking was not the only issue raised by residents. The large groups that the Parks Department rents the facility to and the human defecation due to the lack of restrooms would not be solved by more parking spaces. Sussman responded that these other concerns could be solved through better park management and installation of portable toilets.

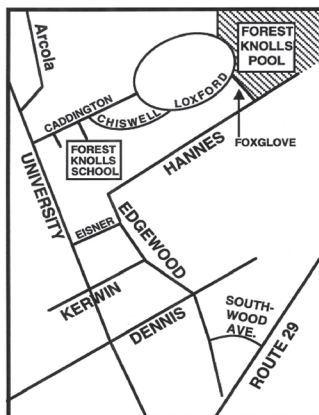
More important is the question as to whether the purpose of the North Four Corners Park is to serve the residents of the surrounding neighborhoods or a much

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Northwood High School Funding

Northwood High School will be reopening as a fully operating high school this fall. The County Council approved \$16.5 million to fund MCPS's request for construction to expand the "core capacity" of the facilities by building an administrative suite in front of the auditorium, a media center in back of the auditorium, and expanding the cafeteria. \$2.5 million of that funding is dedicated to installing central air conditioning in the building. A little over \$9 million in additional funding has been requested in the Board of Education's current capital budget request.

On Monday, March 8, 2004, County Council President Steve Silverman toured the building with Principal Henry Johnson, his assistant principal, and PTA cluster coordinators. Mr. Silverman asked to see what was already funded, and what the additional funding would cover. He was shown the items currently listed as "add alternates" in the plans which are going out to bid shortly. These include: science laboratory improvements, including new case work; technology education laboratory improvements; new ceiling tiles throughout the entire facility; painting the entire facility; toilet improvements, including new partitions and replacement of worn fixtures; window replacements throughout the facility; updated telecommunications wiring; and painting existing lockers. Mr. Silverman ap-

peared to recognize the obvious need for all of these items.

Much of the funding for these items is requested in fiscal years '05 and '06, but over \$4 million is delayed until FY09-10. Cluster coordinators informed Mr. Silverman that the community would like that funding pushed up in order for the work to be completed before the first class graduates from Northwood in 2008.

Community members can support Northwood High School by advocating for full funding of the additional funds requested by the Board of Education for reopening Northwood High School. The County Council completes decisions on the capital budget close to Memorial Day.

The next Northwood High School PTSA meeting is April 20, 2004, in the Northwood cafeteria. Come join your community rebuilding education at Northwood High. ■

(continued from page 7) larger area. Obviously, expanding the park's facilities to attract larger crowds will still have adverse impacts for the surrounding community. Increased parking implies that our local park is serving

a regional clientele rather than local area residents who are more likely to walk or bike there.

As a result of the expanded planning effort, the Parks Department will probably not schedule a public meeting until June. Zepp proposed that the County planners meet with representatives from the community during the development of these new plans so that their concerns might be addressed in a more acceptable manner. This offer was not accepted.

This situation makes clear that only through persistent and determined effort will the community's position be heard and made a priority. The support of our residents will be very important in making this happen. ■
